Message from District IV Director Judy Esposito

It will be very interesting to see how our plants survive the up and down winter weather we are having here in upstate NY. Maybe a lot of what we do this spring will be to salvage what didn't die off due to lack of snow cover. Although the gardens have been asleep, District

IV garden club members have not! You were all busy providing or selling greenery for the holiday season, participating in community events, donating food to your local pantries, and enjoying holiday luncheons. My home club, Ballston Spa, held a holiday luncheon at which a cute Christmas garden poem was read based on "Twas the Night Before Christmas." (Editor Pam Relyea thought you might want to read it, even if it is a little late, so it is printed in this edition following my message.)

Many of our clubs are now working vigorously planning for the 2016-2017 year with lining up programs, scheduling luncheons, and working on club projects and fundraisers. As you plan, I hope everyone will give some consideration to meeting the needs of club members as well as that of the community. The purpose of membership in a garden club should be to encourage participation and fellowship as you seek to beautify your homes and your community in many varying ways. Your programming process, therefore, should begin with thoughtful insight regarding what can realistically be achieved by the active members of your club. There should be a variety of project options for all members, regardless of physical or other limitations. For example, a new garden project may not be advisable to pursue if many members are no longer physically able to plant and tend a garden. This takes into consideration not only those who cannot actively participate, but also the amount of work to be done by perhaps too few club members. The goals and objectives of the National Garden Club (NGC) and the Federated Garden Clubs of NYS (FGCNYS) should also be reviewed for possible activities and projects such as: youth programs, floral design, National Garden Week, Wreaths Across America, Arbor Day, and community beautification. Keeping in mind my previous cautionary example, the NGC is encouraging clubs to create or expand gardens to make them more friendly for the butterflies. The

Additionally, please consider that there may be National, Central Atlantic Regional (CAR) or State awards for many of your activities so please review those listings, document your activities well, and communicate with your club awards chair and/or District IV Awards Chair Jackie Viestenz.

As the new year begins, please brainstorm ways that your club can use all the different forms of media available to us to keep your club "in the news". Community publicity serves to increase club awareness throughout the community, encourage new community contacts, and increase your membership. If your club does not have a publicity chair, consider asking for one or more volunteers to take on this worthwhile job.

Many clubs renew their membership to the Nature Conservancy in the spring, so please send your checks to FGCNYS State Nature Conservancy Chair (and District IV Assistant Director) Mary Dame and note "The Jefferson Project" on the check. This is the Nature Conservancy project that FGCNYS President Pat Wania has chosen for FGCNYS to support. Let's all support this worthwhile project that serves not only our area but is a model for lake research throughout the US.

As District IV Director, I attended the November 17th FGCNYS Board meeting in Guilderland, participated in the District Directors meeting; and was in charge of the food planning. I will also be attending the FGCNYS annual meeting on Long Island, April 11-12. If any District IV club member would like to attend with me, I am happy to travel with others. The brochure for this event should be available on the FGCNYS website soon. Looking towards the fall, the FGCNYS will host the National Garden Clubs - Central Atlantic Region (NGC-CAR) 2016 conference at the Gideon Putnam Hotel in Saratoga Springs on October 23-25, followed by a flower symposium sponsored by the FGCNYS on October 25-27. This will be an excellent opportunity to experience world class demonstrations and workshops, and so close to home! Everyone will have the opportunity to view the gardens on their own at their own pace. You will see annual and perennial gardens located in the 101 acre park. The park has many benches and wide pathways leading through the gardens for the comfort of visitors.

The Elizabeth Park rose garden became a test garden for the American Rose Society in 1912. It is the first municipal rose garden in the U.S., and the third largest rose garden in the country. All types of roses can be found here and should be in full bloom at this time of year. There are more than 15,000 rose bushes in a 2.5 acre area

We will enjoy lunch at the Pond House Café located in the park. Its menu offers fresh organic ingredients grown in their own garden.


